## **Affordable Care Act Mandated Preventive Services**

## What preventative services are covered under ACA Legislation?

The plan covers all preventative services as mandated by the Affordable Care Act. These services are covered in full without a deductible or coinsurance when received from any HealthLink PPO Provider. The US Preventative Task Force (USPSTF) has recommended that all preventative services with an "A" or "B" rating be covered in full. Attached is a list of ACA mandated preventative services covered at 100%. We recommend that you print and keep a copy of this list to discuss with your doctor at appointments if you have personal specific questions as to what is covered prior to having services completed.

Definitions of grades and quality of evidence ratings:

A — Strongly Recommended: The USPSTF strongly recommends that clinicians provide [the service] to eligible patients. The USPSTF found good evidence that [the service] improves important health outcomes and concludes that benefits substantially outweigh harms.

B — Recommended: The USPSTF recommends that clinicians provide [the service] to eligible patients. The USPSTF found at least fair evidence that [the service] improves important health outcomes and concludes that benefits outweigh harms.

	The USPSTF recommends that primary care providers screen women who have family members with breast, ovarian, tubal, or peritoneal cancer with one of several screening tools designed to identify a family history that may be associated with an increased risk for potentially harmful mutations in breast cancer susceptibility genes (BRCA1 or BRCA2). Women with positive screening results should receive genetic counseling and, if indicated after counseling, BRCA testing.	В	December 2013*
Breast cancer preventive medications	The USPSTF recommends that clinicians engage in shared, informed decisionmaking with women who are at increased risk for breast cancer about medications to reduce their risk. For women who are at increased risk for breast cancer and at low risk for adverse medication effects, clinicians should offer to prescribe risk-reducing medications, such as tamoxifen or raloxifene. Screening should be discontinued once a person has not smoked for 15 years or develops a health problem that substantially limits life expectancy or the ability or willingness to have curative lung surgery.
